What are We Talking About?

Licenses applied to PSI

I. PSI: data and datasets produced, managed, collected by PSBs.

II. Licenses:

Output licenses (downstream level)

1.document issued by the PSB which authorises re-use

However they are also

2. Contracts thanks to which third parties give PSI to PSBs

Input licenses (Upstream level)

2. Contracts thanks to which third parties give PSI to PSBs

- What do third parties give exactly?

-Is there any right on the supplied PSI? If so, is there any problem?



May be, if it is not clear what the PSB received

And which uses are enabled

No, if the PSB knows exactly what it got and to which

conditions

What are We Talking About? From the Upstream to the Downstream Framework

Once the PSB concluded suitable input licenses, it is possible to deal with output licenses (re-use licenses)



The content is **not** available

- I. = No access and therefore no re-use
- II. How comes?
 - Even under the new PSI Directive it is not possible to force access and re-use
 - No input licenses/No appropriate input licenses

III. What to do?

- The PSB has to take initiatives at the upstream level
- Once the upstream level is settled, appropriate licenses for reuse shall be introduced and used

The content is available at high costs

- I. = Access and re-use, but high charges = only a few re-users are satisfied
- II. How comes?
 - Under the old PSI Directive, it may be possible
 - Under the new PSI Directive, principle of marginal cost, but for cultural institutions
 - What remains outside (e.g. PSI covered by third parties IPRs)

III. What to do?

- Wait for the transposition of the new PSI Directive into national law
- Raise the awareness of PSBs as to PSI re-use and open data

The content is available at the marginal cost/for free, but not reusable

I.= Wide Access, but no re-use (for technical reasons, **but not only...**)
II.How comes?


- The available data may not be downlodable, readable in different formats
- The optout licenses chosen may create problems (too strict, not interoperable, etc.)
- III. What to do? The PSB shall
 - Take care of the technical issues
 - Choose appropriate re-use licenses

The content is available at the marginal cost/for free and re-usable

- I. = Wide Access, wide? re-use (it depends on the licensing conditions)
- II. How comes?
 - The available data are downlodable, readable in different formats and licensed for re-use
 - Depending on the chosen optout licenses there may be problems (too strict, not interoperable, etc.)
- III. What to do? The PSB shall
 - Choose appropriate re-use licenses for ensuring a WIDE re-use

What is an appropriate licence for PSI Re-Use

I. Shall we opt for an ad hoc licence (top-down) or shall we use an already existing model (bottom-up)?





Re-use for both Commercial and non commercial purposes

Creation of derivative works

No share alike conditions (tricky)



CC BY or CC0 seem to be suitable models

PSI and Open Data

Should we opt for open and interoperable licences +

open format and other technical conditions enabling a wide re-use

We probably get lots of data available for any re-use

And this fosters the economic growth, as well as the social and the cultural development
