

Open Data scenario in MED area in 2010

- Little awareness of the policies of OD and its potential benefits
- Open Data legal frameworks were complex and fragmented
- Governments were not recognising the benefits of making their data open and reusable
- There are difficulties in multilingual search, access and reuse of data

Duration: april 2012 - march 2015


Funded by ERDF through European **Territorial Cooperation** Programme MED 2007-2013 (3.66 M Euros)

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Aims of HOMER

- 1. Stimulate the **accesibility and re-use of Public Sector Information** across the MED area, to unlock the full potential of PSI in strategic economic sectors
- 2. Improve the **access to Public Information by the citizens** in order to participate in the public policies

To:

 guarantee that the public cost of obtaining and managing information, return to society with greater value

COMMUNICATION

Actions of Capitalisation & Harmonisation

Socioeconomic Study:

PSI market 42,000 M€ in EU and 3,600 M€ in partner regions

- Study of state of the art in Open Data policies and strategies
- Technical & Legal requirements for the HOMER Federation
- Federation of Portals:

13 regions have already signed the Memorandum of Understanding. More than 3,400 dataset aggregated






Pilot Actions

Pilot Action A: HACK4MED!

Stimulate innovation in the ICT sector using open and public information.
Simultaneous contest in 5 regions



24 h of hackathon7 partners in 5 regions36 projects re-using OD



Pilot Action B:

Encourage citizen participation in defining policies through the development of new solutions based in the reuse of public sector information

6 partners in 5 countries







Pilot Action B: Andalusia experience



AGAPA has worked in the **agrifood sector in Andalusia**, specially with traditional and local food, involving small traditional industries Solving problems to integrate them in modern channels of distribution




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Transnational award to the best app using HOMER Federation





Pilot Actions. Feedback from data owners and users

OD for creating services needs a high technical skill (OD not for all)

Very poor quality of datasets: not updated or missing some relevant data

Very different formats among similar topic data and even from the same source



Better to have few data but high quality, rather than lot of data

HOMER uses EUROVOC to search metadata but the data are in each partners language

Animators are needed to support citizens in data utilisation





Common Technical, Legal and Governance obstacles

- Lack of specialized skills to manage open databases
- Difficulty to keep the data updated
- Most public data are still collected and managed in non-digital form

- Protection of private and personal data
- Different laws and regulations

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- Each Department Head to decide which information can be opened
- Open Data perceived by administrations as an exercise of transparency but not as motor of growth

Where we are now?


All partners have

- a directive on place (or in the process of doing so);
- OD portals inside the federation;
- few staff trained about OD (with tech and legal expertise);















Where to go NEXT? Some questions

- •Real Federation of Data vs. Federation of OD portals
- Move from Regional OD portals to National ones, or European Commission Open Data portal directly?
- •Can we overcome the language barrier on data? How?
- •Do we have to concentrate only in animation and hackathons, reducing the opening but fostering the reuse?
- •How to link regional activities with national initiatives and European initiatives?
